

### An Introduction to Liberal Arts & Sciences

A Liberal Arts & Sciences education is an approach to learning that empowers and prepares you to deal with complex, diverse and interdisciplinary topics. It helps you to develop a sense of social responsibility by exploring ideas and cultures from all over the world, from ancient times to today. Rather than focusing on a single academic field, in our Liberal Arts & Sciences programme you will gain broad knowledge from different disciplines through studying Global Challenges, and study an area of your interest in depth. At Leiden University College (LUC) you can pick your courses from a variety of disciplines across the sciences, humanities, social sciences, arts and languages, and you will develop key analytical and writing skills. Central to the programme at LUC are Global Challenges facing humanity today: Peace & Justice, Sustainability, Prosperity and Diversity. By exploring various areas of study, you can combine your talents and interests to create a programme unique to you. Depending on the direction (major) you choose, you will graduate with a Bachelor of Science or a Bachelor of Arts degree.

### **International Honours College**

Leiden University College (LUC) The Hague offers a three-year bachelor's degree, taught in English: an interdisciplinary Liberal Arts & Sciences programme. Each year, 200 students are admitted to this residential international honours college where LUC students live and learn on-campus in a community focused on making an impact in society. This selective programme is a great opportunity for talented, open-minded and ambitious students from all over the world. The challenging curriculum offers six majors based on Global Challenges: World Politics; International Justice; Culture, History and Society; Earth, Energy and Sustainability; Governance, Economics and Development; and Global Public Health.

### What makes LUC special?

LUC's international environment brings together students from over 50 countries. The campus is close to over 150 international organisations such as the International Criminal Court, the UN Permanent Court of Arbitration, the Organisation for the Prohibition of Chemical Weapons and many embassies, offering ample opportunity for internships and career development.

All first and second year students live on campus, combining academic and social activities. While studying at LUC, you can participate in a range of activities, clubs and traditions. LUC also provides excellent personal and academic support to help you succeed throughout your studies.

#### Why The Hague?

At Leiden University in The Hague, you are at the very centre of Dutch and global politics and international law. The Hague is an internationally oriented city due to the numerous embassies, multinationals and high-level courts. It is the perfect place to study the many challenges affecting humanity, whether it involves tackling global poverty or creating safe, sustainable cities. These challenges require an interdisciplinary approach, which is exactly what Leiden University in The Hague offers by focusing on international law, peace and security, politics and public administration, urban issues and health. Also, The Hague is the fastest growing student city in the country, and you can be a part of it!

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## Admissions & **Application Procedure**

Each year LUC selects 200 highly motivated and talented students from a pool of applicants. In order to be considered for admission all applicants need to apply in Studielink and submit the following documents in the Application Portal:

- ▶ Copy of your most recent secondary school transcript (and diploma if obtained already)
- ▶ LUC motivation form
- > LUC form
- ▶ One recommendation letter
- ▶ Application fee if applicable

Complete applications are reviewed by the Admissions Committee. With a positive review, you are invited for an admission interview as a final step of the application process.

#### **Entry Requirements**

▶ **Diploma requirements:** LUC The Hague accepts a Dutch VWO diploma or a secondary school diploma equivalent to it, such as the IB Diploma, the European Baccalaureate, A-levels or the German Abitur, Please check the website for a full list of equivalent diplomas and grade requirements.

- **Language requirements:** The programme is fully taught in English, and all students need to prove English language proficiency by submitting an English language test. Students with certain diplomas are exempted.
- ▶ Mathematical requirements: All applicants must have a general understanding of mathematics to pass the mandatory mathematics course in the first year.

#### **Application Deadlines**

LUC has one intake each year in the fall (end of August) and two application deadlines:

- ▶ Early Bird: 1 December 2023
- Regular: 15 March 2024

We advise you to apply by the Early Bird deadline if you would like to receive an admissions answer before April 2024, if you need a visa, and/or if you are applying for financial aid.

22:00 I finish up my reading for tomorrow.

00:00 I have a chat with my neighbours on my floor before heading to bed.









### What are Global Challenges?

Global Challenges are major issues facing humanity and the planet. They cannot be solved by one nation, institution or organisation on its own. Interdisciplinary cooperation between academics, governments, organisations and individuals is required to understand these issues by combining and sharing knowledge and skills

so that they can be addressed collectively. In year one, you will follow courses dedicated to Global Challenges. These courses will help you develop interdisciplinary thinking. The plenary lectures on Global Challenges introduce you to a new topic every week and are given by specialists from different fields. The lectures are supplemented by

small-scale seminars in which you will apply the knowledge to concrete cases. Global Challenges are a central thread within our curriculum, which runs through all three years of the programme, and return in a variety of courses.

# Liberal Arts and Sciences: Academic Programme

LUC's three-year Bachelor's programme is divided into 4 blocks per year. Each block ends with a reading week (exam week) and is followed by a break.

#### Your first year

In the four Global Challenge courses you explore the core themes of the programme, and this will also help you narrow down where your interests lie. You will follow a few

courses that help build a solid foundation for your studies, including writing and statistics. And you have free choice: 4 elective spaces to pick from 35 different options.

#### Your Second and Third Year

From year 2 onwards, you will specalise in a major of your choice. With support from LUC academic and study advisors, you will create a tailor-made curriculum by selecting from an

array of courses that fall within your chosen major. You will supplement your major with a minor or other elective options, and with the Global Citizenship component. You can also opt for a semester abroad. Year 3 wraps up with a capstone: the equivalent of a Bachelor's thesis.

#### Intensive and student-centred

What sets LUC apart?

- ▶ An intensive and small-scale programme with an average of 18 students per class.
- Dynamic teaching methods: presentations, discussions, group work, papers, assignments, moot courts, simulations, case studies and field work.
- ▶ Continuous assessment: you are evaluated based on several assignments, tests and presentations throughout the block, rather than a single exam taken at the end of the block. This means you get feedback on a regular basis, which boosts your learning.
- ▶ LUC's academic staff conduct research and are inspiring teachers dedicated to your learning process. In addition, they provide guidance to you in their role as academic advisers throughout all three years at LUC.

#### Global Citizenship programme

You develop Global Citizenship skills when you learn to communicate across cultural and national divides and position yourself in relation to different contexts and peoples. The values of global citizenship are present throughout the entire LUC programme, and are essential to the programme as it is focused on Global Challenges. You will fulfill a global citizenship component as part of the programme. Some examples of this are:

- ▶ Community Project: Tutor pupils from our multicultural society on a local school and gain hands-on experience.
- ▶ Struggle in the City: explore the multidimensional experiences of residents in The Hague; including struggles which are often invisible.
- ▶ Sustainable Livelihoods: Participate in a field course in East Africa or Terschelling.

#### Next to your major

Besides your major, there are ways to add breadth and specialize in fields additional to your major. You can do this in a couple of ways:

### 1. Follow a set of pre-structured courses around a theme:

- ▶ Psychology
- ▶ Gender Studies
- ▶ Journalism
- ▶ Philosophy
- ▶ Languages: Arabic, Dutch, French, Spanish or Russian.

#### 2. Minor in a major

In consultation with your study adviser, you can select a combination of courses (total of 30 EC) within one of LUC's six majors.

### 3. Minor at Leiden University or another university

You can also follow a minor at Leiden University and other institutions in the Netherlands.

#### Semester abroad

LUC offers excellent students the exciting and challenging opportunity to experience living and studying in another country as an integrated part of their academic programme. The credits obtained during the study abroad semester count towards your degree. In addition to participation in the university-wide exchange programmes, LUC has its own unique exchange agreements with a selected group of universities and colleges around the world, from New Orleans to Hong Kong.

#### Internships

You can do an internship for credits during your studies and benefit from the many international organisations, institutions and embassies in The Hague.

#### Capstone

Crowning your LUC career is the Capstone project; a final piece of independent research in which you apply the subject knowledge, academic, analytical, and methodological skills you have acquired during your studies.

All capstone projects are carefully supervised by our research-active academic staff.

#### Special programmes

At LUC, we offer two additional special programmes students can choose:

- ➤ Arts: students who who are interested in fine or performing arts, there is the option of taking courses or even a full minor at the Academy of Performing and Creative Arts. This Leiden University institute works closely with the Royal Conservatory and the Royal Academy of Creative Arts in The Hague.
- Dual Law Degree: when you complete the Major International Justice, you can combine this with the double degree programme at our Law Faculty. You will obtain a degree in Dutch law ('LLB Rechtsgeleerdheid') alongside your Liberal Arts & Sciences diploma. This double degree programme is taught in Dutch, and completing it means your Bachelor's will take four years.



### LUC Science Lab

The LUC Science Lab provides students with facilities for hands-on training and experience with fundamental scientific procedures related to the fields of sustainability and health. The laboratory supports LUC courses and also student research projects, including Capstone (bachelor thesis) research.



To help you handle the level of academic autonomy you have in our programme and guide you in your intellectual and personal development, LUC has a strong support network.

### **Academic Support**

Academic Advisor: When you arrive at LUC, you are assigned an Academic Advisor (a member of the academic staff) and a Mentor (a student from year 2 or 3). They help you in the transition to a demanding academic environment, guide you when you pick a major, or help you work on your study skills. There are several individual or group meetings per academic year. At the end of year 1, you will pick a major. From then onwards, you can approach academics in your major for advice on courses, tracks, external courses, capstone ideas and more.

**Study Advisor:** a Study Advisor is available to support students in selecting courses, monitoring their progress and helping them to succeed at LUC. Additionally, the Study Advisor supports students in navigating the different services and regulations which are available at Leiden University.

#### **Personal Support**

Adjusting to university life and college culture can be quite a challenge. Besides the academic support, you also have access to an extensive support system that is unique in the Netherlands.

**Student Life Officer:** the Student Life Officer is in charge of all residential aspects of student life and oversees the Residential Assitant team.

Residential Assistants: there is one Residential Assistant, a senior student, on each floor. They are a first point of contact in case of emergency but are also in charge of creating a community feeling on each floor.

**Student Life Counselors:** the Student Life Counselors provide emotional and psychological support and are available throughout the week. Students may be referred to an external support service if needed.

#### **Head Residential Assistant**

'The programme is residential the first two years, which means we live and study in one building at the campus in The Hague. The residential setting gives plenty of opportunities to learn about each other, our cultures, interests, and more. There are 400 students living here on 17 floors. Each floor has a Residential Assistant, and I am one of them! In this role, we try to foster community spirit and wellbeing. We are also the first point of contact for physical or mental health issues, for which we get a training that we will use far beyond our time at LUC. It is really gratifying to be able to help and participate in our community; whilst our studies often take a global scale, being a Residential Assistant enables me to act on a local level."



# Find your home away from home in The Hague. Students live and study in our college building in The Hague's vibrant city centre.

The Hague is home to embassies, multinationals and international courts, as well as important government ministries, and is globally recognised as the international city of peace, justice and security. As all major institutions are within walking distance of the university, your future internship or work could literally be just around the corner. Many professionals working in the city pop in regularly for guest lectures, making it the ideal place to benefit from hands-on insights from experts in the field.

### International student city

As an international city, The Hague offers the chance to meet people from all corners of the world. This is a great opportunity to broaden your horizons and develop networks that

will help if you later go abroad to work, study or do an internship. The Hague is also the centre of government and national politics in the Netherlands, so don't be surprised if you see the prime minister cycling or drinking a cappuccino at the next table.

#### Places to be

What about your free time? The city has 35 museums and 22 theatres and concert venues. It also has hundreds of restaurants, coffee bars and cafés. You'll never be bored! There are festivals and events throughout the year and Scheveningen, or The Hague's 'back yard', is within cycling distance: 11 kilometres of beach and a lively promenade packed with great beach bars right on your doorstep.

#### The LUC Community

The LUC community consists of a diverse team of staff members from 5 continents, and 600 students of whom 400 live in the college building. LUC students come from all over the world, over 50 different nationalities are represented. By interacting with your peers, learning continues outside the classroom while living at LUC.

### Meeting your neighbours

You will be welcomed at LUC by the Residential Assistant (RA) of your floor. You will quickly get to know your neighbours through the many floor dinners and events organised by the RA. Floor activities are a big part of the LUC community experience.

#### **Student Association: Fortuna**

All students become a member of the student association Fortuna which is in charge of

most student activities and student-run events on campus.

Fortuna aims to represent the interests of all students enrolled at LUC by maintaining contact between members of the association and other important bodies within LUC, promoting the development and ensuring the continuity of committees set up by members of the association, representing the student body as a whole to the outside world, and organising activities to broaden the horizons of LUC students outside the curriculum.

Members of Fortuna may enjoy events such as movie nights, (themed) parties, career-related events, Model United Nations conferences, and Dutch language courses amongst other activities. Every year, an inter-UC tournament is organised between all the university colleges of the Netherlands, during which each university college sends sports teams, dancing groups, singing groups, and artists to engage in some friendly competition.







#### **College Building**

The college building is located next to The Hague Central Station and the Royal Library. The 21-story building includes all living and learning facilities. The first 4 floors are dedicated to academic and social life including classrooms, study areas, meeting areas, a grand café, a lounge, a student-run bar and offices for staff, faculty and students.

The residential areas for students start from the fifth floor upwards. Students get a single studio apartment. Every floor houses between 17 and 26 students and one Residential Assistant (2nd or 3rd year student), and has a common room where students get together to study, eat and socialise. There are laundry and bike storage facilities on the ground floor. Having the city centre of The Hague and a park of 10 hectares called Haagse Bos as its 'backyard' makes the Anna van Buerenplein (or AvB, as our students call the building) a vibrant home for students to study and live together.

#### LUC Studios

Students have a self-contained studio of approximately 27 m<sup>2</sup> with private facilities. This includes:

- ▶ Furniture
- ▶ Kitchen area
- ▶ Bathroom with a toilet, shower and washbasin with mirror
- ▶ Internet and TV connection

### The LUC building is home to many facilities

- ▶ Fully equipped science lab
- ▶ Digital lab
- ▶ Writing studio
- ▶ Student Information Desk
- ➤ The office of Fortuna, LUC's student association
- ▶ Coasters, a bar run by students
- ▶ Study Area
- ➤ Soundproof room for debating or rehearsals (music, theatre or plays)
- ▶ Audio and video equipment
- ➤ An outdoor terrace on the 4th floor

#### Finances

Tuition fees are determined by your nationalily. Because LUC offers a small-scale and intensive programme, tuition fees are higher than regular study programmes. The academic fees for LUC The Hague for the academic year 2024-2025 are:

- **>** EU Tuition Fee: € 2,530 (year 1: € 1,265\*)
- ▶ Institutional Fee (applies to all): € 2,795
- Non-EU Tuition Fee: € 16,500
- \* Applicable for all first year students with EU nationality who enroll in the Dutch Higher Education System for the first time.

The average cost per mont of a studio apartment including service fees is € 620 (2023/2024 academic year, additional municipal taxes may apply). All students who are 18 years old and above are eligible for rent subsidy from the Dutch government. The rent subsidy is approximately €200 per month and can be used to cover part of the rent.

#### **Financial support**

If you are accepted into LUC The Hague, you are eligible to apply for financial support. LUC offers financial support in the form of waivers for students who demonstrate financial need. We strongly encourage you to apply by the Early Bird deadline in order to apply for financial support.

'After LUC, I worked for one year with Oxfam Novib in The Hague before pursuing a two-year master's in International Development at SciencesPo in Paris. I currently work at the The Hague Institute for Innovation of Law (HiilL), as Programme Director. HiiL is a social enterprise that works at improving access to justice, focusing mostly on the Middle East, Africa and the Netherlands. As a director I oversee the implementation of projects across our portfolio, with projects ranging from data collection on the justice needs of people in South Sudan, to a justice innovation challenge in East Africa for small companies that might receive funding from us to scale-up. LUC taught me to think critically, how to work results-oriented with people from different backgrounds, and appreciate global and national dynamics outside of 'one' regular discipline. Being able to step outside a theoretical framework and combining all practical knowledge you have on one subject matter proved to be a crucial skill in tackling real-world problems.'


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
